





Although India produces the highest number of intellectual capital, it has one of the lowest Gross Enrolment Ratio (GER) in Higher Education among the BRIC nations. India needs Universities in large numbers and the Government although has increased the expenditure on education, will not be able to meet the target unless quality State Private Universities take the lead and responsibility.

An Act to establish and incorporate in the State of Karnataka a University of unitary nature in private ctor by the Garden City Education Trust to promote and undertake the advancement of applied University lucation in General, Technical, Health, Management, Life Sciences and allied sectors and for the matters nnected therewith or incidental thereto

Whereas it is expedient to establish and incorporate in the State of Karnataka a University of unitary ature in private sector by the Garden City Education Trust to promote and undertake the advancement of plied University Education in Technical, Health, Management, life sciences and allied sectors and for the atters connected therewith or incidental thereto for the purposes hereinafter appearing;

Be it enacted by the Karnataka State Legislature in the sixty fourth year of the Republic of India as llows:-

CHAPTER - I

PRELIMINARY

- 1. Short title, extent and commencement:-(1) This Act may be called the Garden City University Act,
 - (2) It extends to the whole of the State of Karnataka.
- (3) It shall come into force on such date as the State Government may, by notification, in the official zette, appoint.
 - 2. Definitions:-In this Act, unless the context otherwise requires,-
 - (a) "Academic Council" means the Academic Council of the University as specified in section 25;
- (b) "Agenda Matters" means all the matters and businesses to be designated in the Statutes each of ich can be either included in the Agenda or be taken up for discussion and decision at a meeting of the

EXAMINATION & EVALUATION

End Semester Examination (ESE)

- Assessment Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA)+End Semester Examination (ESE)-40%+60%
- The duration of the ESE varies based on the number of credits of the course. For a 4-credit course the ESE is for 2 hours. For a 3-credit course the ESE is for 1½ hours and for a 2-credit course it is for one hour.
- The question papers are generated through an automated system.
- Pre-preparation of question bank reviewed by internal as well as external experts.
- Every question paper has a bar code on the top right-hand corner. The question papers carry a barcode indicating the course type.
- For courses that are common to all the programmes different types of question papers (A, B, C) are generated to avoid malpractice.
- Check points and security features in the system:

The system is designed in such a way that it permits the generation of question papers of only those courses that have an examination on that day. As such there cannot be a pre-printing of the question paper.

Every question paper carries a unique bar code that is linked to the subject code.

There is an OTP created during generating the question paper, the OTP is received by the Controller of Examinations through mail and the paper can be viewed only by providing the right OTP.

The question papers can be printed only in the access monitored printer attached to the given system.

The question papers are printed on papers that carry a security feature.

The question papers generated and printed are then distributed room wise in various packets and sealed before taking it out of the control room.

- The answer booklets are designed such that they
 do not carry the register number of the student,
 instead there is a unique bar code which each
 answer booklet carries and this unique bar code is
 linked to the student register number, the semester,
 the programme and the course.
- Registration for examination is online and the hall tickets are also generated online through the GCU student portal.
- The hall tickets are linked to the attendance as well as the CIA, thus the students who fail to secure the required attendance and CIA will not be able to print their hall tickets.
- The hall tickets carry a bar code which is scanned during their entry into the examination hall. This bar code is linked to the student register number and the photo. Students who are not eligible are denied access in to the examination hall.
- The seating positions of each student is marked by a seat number instead of the register number.
 A seat matrix paste at the entrance of the examination venue helps the student identify the seat number they are tagged to.
- The students are required to be in the examination hall 30 minutes prior to the commencement of the examination. Students are strictly prohibited entry if they are late.
- Once in the examination hall the first 30 minutes is used to distribute the answer booklets, take the signature of the student in the room supervisor diary. The question papers are distributed 10 minutes prior to the commencement of the examination, the students are given a 10 minutes reading time.
- Students are expected to remain in the examination hall till the completion of the examination and are not permitted to leave earlier.
- The entire process of examination is under surveillance, and a team of squad members constantly monitor the process.
- The university has established a University Malpractices Lapses Enquiry Committee (GCU UMLEC -University Malpractices & Lapses Enquiry Committee) that would check on all the malpractice cases.
- End Semester Examination for a few courses is online (MCQ) type as well as practical performance based



ESE Evaluation Procedure GCU Board of Evaluation (BoE):


- The BoE is responsible to conduct the centralized evaluation process. The board conducts two types of evaluations: Written exam and Online evaluation.
- Evaluation of Online examination: The SEC papers such as Speaking Kannada, Use cases of predictive analytics examinations are conducted online and the evaluation is also done automatically.
- Evaluation of written examination process:

- The first steps starts with the appointment of examiners for each semester which shall be made and confirmed before 30 days of the commencement of the examination for both theory and practical. The list of examiners and reviewers are prepared and handed over to board of evaluation for the conduct of centralized valuation.
- In case of UG The list of internal evaluator and the reviewer will be handed over to BoE.
- In case of PG The list of internal evaluator and external evaluator will be handed over to BoE.
- In case of practical and Viva voce examination -The list of internal evaluator and external evaluator will be handed over to BoE.
- Online examination Computerized evaluation is integrated into the system.


The process of Online examination

The evaluation process of Written examination (PG - Dual Evaluation)




- The board of evaluation will receive the answer scripts on session basis from the board of examination and the scripts are recoded with random barcode numbers. After recoding the answer scripts are ready for evaluation.
- The examiner/Evaluator and reviewer will jointly prepare the answer key and has to submit the same to the board of evaluation before they start the evaluation.
- The answer scripts are evaluated by the Examiner/ Evaluator and then reviewed by the reviewer. The reviewer values the 20% of the answer scripts and will check the total of all the scripts.
- The marks will be entered in the portal by the evaluator, and the entered marks will be duly verified by the Custodian of the evaluation.
- On completion of entire evaluation, the results will be published in the GCU portal.

Norms of Revaluation (2018)

- Revaluation norms as created by the Office of Controller of Examinations, Garden City University is as per the standards of the University Academic Evaluation Standards and any decision considered by the Garden City University Evaluation & Assessment Committee will stand as final statement (duly signed by the Registrar, Garden City University).
- The student should remit the revaluation fee of Seven hundred and fifty rupees only for individual course/paper through online. This is to inform the student that a receipt no. will be generated once the online payment is accepted.
- If the marks awarded by the revaluation committee has an enhancement of 20% from the original marks secured by the student, the revaluation fee will be refunded.
- In case, if there is no change in the marks secured after the revaluation it will be communicated to student as 'No Change in Marks Obtained'.

- The student should abide by the norms prescribed under the revaluation committee and should accept the revised marks as per the below mentioned categories:
 - a) there can be "NO CHANGE IN MARKS OBTAINED"
 - b) there can be "ENHANCEMENT IN MARKS OBTAINED"
 - c) there can be "DECREASE IN MARKS OBTAINED"
- If there is no change in marks post the revaluation process, the marks obtained by the student in the previous assessment will only be considered and there will be no further changes accepted. The student should select the courses in which you seek revaluation very carefully. There will be no second chance to apply for revaluation for any additional courses/papers. The result announced by the evaluation committee is final.
- The change in marks (if any) shall be conveyed to student through the students' portal only.
- The student should abide by the final marks statement.

University Malpractices Lapses Enquiry Committee

The University has constituted a University Malpractices Lapses Enquiry Committee (UMLEC) to investigate malpractices during examination process. The committee has constituted a frisking and squad team who looks in to the malpractices during conduct of examination. The frisking team would check on the students before entry in to the examination hall for possession of any material for copying. The squad team pays surprise visits to the class to check for malpractice and also continuously monitor the process through CCTV installed in all the venue.

End semester examinations for the I semester UG programmes was conducted from 4th to 9th December and for PG programmes from 10th to 18th January 2018.

Cases of attempt to malpractice

Students were found trying to discuss amongst their peer, such students were warned and advised not to repeat the same.

Students are not permitted to write their register numbers anywhere in the answer scripts and if done so it is considered as malpractice. Students who were found to have written the register numbers were:












LITERARY CLUB


MANAGEMENT CLUB

Camps




LIBRARY - LEARNING RESOURCES











INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS' CELL

Bangalore is known as the "Silicon Valley of India" in view of its role as India's leading IT hub, because of which a huge influx of international students happen in the city every year. Students from as many as 80 countries has preferred the brand Garden City in shaping their dream career. The diaspora of students at GCU is enriched with students from countries like Oman, France, Iran, Sudan, Saudi Arabia, Sri Lanka, Maldives, Nepal, Ivory Coast, Republic of Korea, Tanzania, Thailand, China, Congo, Nigeria, Cameroon, Yemen and many more. An exclusive office by name of International Students Affairs Cell (ISAC) is thus created to deal with the admissions & guidance of international students at GCU. The ISAC addresses various legal, academic, social

and other issues pertaining to the international students taking admission at GCU. A senior faculty member from each School of Study is appointed as the Coordinator of the cell, who attends to these students as frequently as possible and enable their stay and study comfortable with the support of the Director of ISAC.

Extra care is taken to provide them available facilities on priority. These students enrich the campus life by their sincere support in classroom affairs to social gatherings.



ANTI RAGGING MEASURES

Ragging Means:

- Any disorderly conduct whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness any other student.
- Indulging in undisciplined activities which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological or physical harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in a fresher or a junior student.
- Teasing, embarrassing, humiliating, assaulting or using criminal force or criminal intimidation, wrongful restraining or confining or causing grievous hurt, kidnapping, extortion or molesting or committing unnatural offences or causing death or abetting suicide, use of criminal force, criminal trespass and intimidation.
- Asking the students to do any act or perform something which student is not willing in the ordinary course and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the psyche or physique of a fresher or a junior student.

Punishable Acts of Ragging:

- Abetment / instigation to ragging / criminal conspiracy to rag
- Unlawful assembly and rioting while ragging
- Injury to body, causing hurt / mental trauma
- Public nuisance created during ragging, or violation of decency and morals
- Physical or psychological humiliation
- · Wrongful restraint, confinement
- Use of criminal force / assault / sexual offences / unnatural offences
- Extortion / criminal trespassing or intimidation / offences against property
- Attempt to commit any or all of the above mentioned offences against the victim

- Any act / abuse by spoken words, e-mails, snail mails, blogs, public insults etc
- Any act that prevents, disrupts or disturbs the regular academic activity of a student

Prohibition of Ragging:

- Ragging within the Garden City University Campus including its Institutions / Departments and Hostels is strictly prohibited
- Ragging in any form is prohibited also in the private lodges/buildings where Garden City University students are staying
- No person including students / staff / faculty/ non-teaching staff shall participate or abet or propagate ragging in any form

Measures for Curbing Ragging:

- The Advertisement for Admissions will clearly mention: "Ragging is totally banned in Garden City University and anyone found guilty of ragging and/or abetting ragging will be appropriately punished"
- Garden City University will conduct awareness programme on anti-ragging & consequences of ragging & hand-outs will also have full text of Anti-Ragging Regulations.
- Hostel students will be well informed of anti-ragging regulations & will have to fill an Application Form before admitting to the Garden City University Hostel
- Create awareness through wide spread publicity posters, leaflets etc. among the students, parents and guardians before start of the academic session. The posters and banners etc., will be displayed at least 10 days before the start of this semester in all prominent places including Hostels, Cafeterias and common activity areas and entry points

Punishments against Ragging:

Depending upon the nature and gravity of the offence as established by the anti-ragging Committee of the University, the possible punishments for those found guilty of ragging at the institution level shall be any one or any combination of the following:

- Suspension from attending classes and academic privileges
- Withholding / withdrawing scholarship / fellowship and other benefits
- Forfeiting campus placement opportunities / recommendations
- Debarring from representing the institution in any regional, national or international meet, tournament, youth festival, etc
- Debarring from appearing in any test/examination or other evaluation process
- · Withholding of results
- · Suspension/ expulsion from the hostel.
- · Cancellation of admission
- · Rustication from the institution
- Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution for a specific period of time
- More severe punishment were justified such as fine / imprisonment etc
- Collective punishment: When the persons committing or abetting the crime of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment as a deterrent to ensure community pressure on the potential raggers

In addition, in case of every single incident of ragging, a First Information Report (FIR) will be filed with the local police authorities. The possible punishment includes rigorous imprisonment (in compliance with the order of Supreme Court of India, UGC regulations & guidelines & Karnataka Government Orders).

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS:

(a) Anti-Ragging Committees:

- The "Anti-Ragging Committee" at GCU is headed by the Registrar of the University. It will comprise of selected faculty members, students from the fresher's category as well as seniors and selected non-teaching staff
- This Committee will be fully and totally responsible to ensure that no incidence of ragging as given in these regulations takes place and will also monitor and ensure that the instructions of these regulations are followed fully at all times
- The Committee will also maintain alert vigil at all times and ensure that the Anti-Ragging Squads of the Institutions carry out their functions properly

(b)Anti-Ragging Squads/Patrols:

- Anti-Ragging Squads will constitute members of faculty with Head of school as the in-charge.
 The number of squads will be based on the strength of the students so that the Anti-Ragging Measures can be effectively implemented
- Anti-Ragging Squads will comprise of senior faculty members and responsible representatives of senior and fresher students. Its function will include going around / patrolling the Institution and the Campus common areas, maintain vigil and take action if they notice any incidence of ragging either in our Institution or any other area in the vicinity of the Campus

Action Procedure:

- Anti-Ragging Squads and Anti-Ragging Patrols
 will immediately report any incidence of ragging
 or abetment of ragging noticed by them to the
 Anti-Ragging in-charge immediately and also to
 the Anti-Ragging Committee head of each school
- Anti-Ragging Committee will take immediate action as per the situation which may include:
 - Immediate suspension of involved students
 - Sending reinforcements or any medical help if required
- Forward the main gist / report of incidence to the Anti-Ragging Committee and the monitoring cell
- The Anti-Ragging Committee will examine the report and recommend appropriate punishment which will be awarded after the approval of the Monitoring Cell. (Reporting of the matter to the Civil Police or lodging of complaint / FIR will not be done without the approval from Chancellor / Vice-Chancellor / Pro-Vice-Chancellor)







CONCEPT OF OBJECTIVE ORIENTED OPERATIONS IN EDUCATION (O³E)

This academic provision ensures that the curriculum is designed based on the set of objectives being developed depending on the practical needs. This model helped us in developing the mathematical concept of "KLAAp" which is the fundamental tool to estimate the percentage of learning outcome for a particular course.

The concept emphasizes on the importance of Objective Oriented curriculum planning for systematic & continual improvement of the academic practices. This academic tool develops a continuous assessment of the designed curriculum and generates reports on scope for further improvement. This system is an example of feed induced product management. The following graphical representation defines the core components of the process cycle.

The relationship pathway as shown below determines the proximity between the components of the academic planning & regulation system.

The stages of Objective Oriented Operations in Education (O^3E^{TM}) is classified into three needs as a) Institution b) Programme & c) Curriculum.


The sequential designing process involves the mapping of the Institutional components with the programme objectives & further curriculum outcome accomplishment should be mapped to determine the success rate of Objective Accomplishment Index.

The curriculum design (CD) is based on the development of three different types of objectives which are considered as major factors driving the two other components of curriculum, i.e., Curriculum evaluation & Curriculum Objective Accomplishment. The evaluation model for a curriculum design is based on the objectives that are defined by the Course Designer. The validation of the defined objectives for a particular course is reported through the Curriculum Development & Enrichment Index (CDEI).

According to this index each programme/course is designed based on two components, namely University Compulsory Allocation (UCA) & Course Designer Prerogative (CDP), which is assigned to determine the successful implementation of the programme/course objectives.

UCA is defined as 60% of the total weightage from the learning outcome estimation, being equally distributed in all the compartments of a programme/course (for e.g., units). This is introduced to provide equal importance to each unit in the course.

CDP is designated as 40 % of the total weightage from the learning outcome estimation. In case of CDP, there was a necessity to measure the improvements between the programme objectives and the curriculum evaluation & accomplishments.



Total Quality Framework

Primarily, the mandate of TQF will be to address the following aspects of the University:

- 1. Monitoring overall quality governance in the University
- 2. Meeting the objects of the University
- 3. Development of reputation of the University
- 4. Building a Unique Selling Proposition (USP) of the University
- 5. Initiation of Nation building activities in the University
- 6. Meeting world standards in education

These mandates of the TQF will be carried out by four sub-departments, namely, Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), University Social responsibility (USR) Cell, Industry Connects (ICONS) and Market Research & Feasibility Study (MRFS) Wing

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

The internal quality assurance mechanism of the institution is constituted as "Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)", meant for planning, guiding and monitoring Quality Assurance (QA) and Quality Enhancement (QE) activities of the University. The IQAC will channelize and systematize the efforts and measures of the University towards academic excellence.

The goals of IQAC at GCU will be:

- To develop a quality system for conscious, consistent and catalytic programmed action to improve the academic and administrative performance of the University
- To promote measures for institutional functioning towards quality enhancement through internationalization of quality culture and institutionalization of best practices

The role of IQAC will be to recommend and review courses of study and curricula in the respective stream of the University with respect to its economic and professional viability. IQAC will also suggest measures to improve curricula and evaluation system in the University. Besides this, it may also help the University in other processes of consultancy work, placement collaborations, industry MOUs, etc. The framework will also incorporate activities related to social responsibilities.

University Social Responsibility (USR) Cell

USR (University Social Responsibility) cell will catalyse the rise of a community engagement movement offering a range of possibilities for the University to function as a 'site of citizenship'. These include contributing to community, social and economic infrastructure, supporting equity and diversity within higher education and education for democratic citizenship. While University – community engagement contributes to the public good, it also reflects a changed economic and social context in which concepts of community have superseded broader notions of the social.

Industry Connects (ICONS) Wing

GCU aims at disseminating and advancing knowledge by providing instructional and research facilities in various branches of learning. It promotes innovation in teaching and learning process, interdisciplinary studies & research, and establishes linkages with industries with an aim to educate and train man-power for the development of the country. The University is committed to the improvement of the social and economic conditions and welfare of the people by improving their intellectual, academic and cultural development. The industry interface at GCU, named ICONS (Industry CONnect), will be responsible for facilitating the development of mutual relationships between the University and partners from different industrial and professional sector in the country to integrate industrial and professional inputs with the teaching-learning processes. It aims to improve students' awareness of job function in the industries, so that they can adapt to industrial environment, after attaining proper practical and relevant knowledge, skills and competencies and to be prepared to be selfemployed. 


