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Executive Summary

Setting new benchmarks in higher education

The Annual report 2018-19 of Garden City University encapsulates the overall activities of the University for the academic year 2018-19 to achieve standards of imparting outcome based education and holistic development of students. The exhaustive report provides a complete overview. The University is in its second year of operations and in these two years, the University has ensured to provide a very conducive environment towards learning.

The leading achievement during the last academic year was the visit of the UGC Expert Committee constituted by UGC for inspection of the standards implemented in the University and submission of the compliance report to UGC with their recommendations. Thereby Garden City University was recognized as one of the youngest University to have contacted UGC Expert Committee for an inspection and it resulted in Garden City University being approved by UGC, Government of India.

The University had also applied to the Association of Indian Universities (AIU) for membership and the same was approved and we are glad to be listed as a member of the AIU.

Curriculum Design at GCU

The curriculum followed in the University is crafted very carefully keeping in mind the current advances in various fields of study. The team involved in curating the syllabi includes experts in the area along with experts from the industry. The University has adopted the Choice Based Credit System of curriculum designing and we find the students and faculty members to have well adopted the system.

The academic flexibility and autonomy vested as in a State Private University has aided the changes pertaining to designing better curriculum and forging relationship with the best Universities in the world especially from Spain, UK and France

A University that grows with the students

The student enrolment witnessed a positive momentum with in growth from the previous academic year. Deserving students were awarded scholarships amounting to INR

5.3 crores. Besides this, seventeen other external scholarships have been facilitated to the students of GCU.

With a legacy of being a host to students from 81 nations, the academic year 2018-19 saw student representation from 19 countries and all the States and Union Territories of India.

The overall results of the End Semester Examinations showed a prudent range of 65-72 % pass in Undergraduate Programmes and a 90-95% pass in Postgraduate Programmes.

Research and Innovation

The research and innovation council of GCU hosted activities that engaged students and faculty members in research, training and development.

MDPs in association with BAIF Development Research Foundation and Entrepreneurship camps in association with DST-NIMAT Project, Govt. of India are among the funded and government collaborated activities taken-up by GCU.

Quite a number of MoUs including Industry tie-ups, University partnerships and professional training programmes were signed. Several innovative ideas were filed for patent. The University has also published the 2nd Volume of Journals from various Departments.

The University every year organizes Fresherism (FRESHERS DAY) to introduce the new students with the campus culture and lift the comfort level. The event is organized by the seniors with assistance from the teachers of the institution. Furthermore, the campus has the record of having no instances of ragging with proactive measures taken by the monitoring committee and sensitization of students as per UGC directives.

PTA Meets

The university also emphasizes on building a beautiful student-parent-teacher relationship and hosts PTA meets from time to time with provisions for video calls on WhatsApp or SKYPE with parents at their convenient time.

Positive psychology

Promoting the concept of Positive Psychology, the University follows the PERMA model of wellbeing (Positive-Emotions, Engagement, Positive Relationship, Meaning and Accomplishment) under the guidance of the Counselling Centre - Department of Psychology. Its activities include individual capacity building, counselling and developmental group activities.

The global perspective of education was enhanced through a study abroad programme in France and Spain. Knowledge transfer and cultural exchange MoUs were signed with 7 Universities across the globe.

The Placement and Training Cell

The placements and training cell organized different Internship and placement training activities across various departments in the University. 157 companies have visited the University for Placements and Internships which stand testimony to the quality of students.

The IQAC conducted scheduled academic audits to ensure optimum performance at all the schools in the University and administrative audits at various operational and support units of the University.





Garden City University is a student centric University having a focused research directive and practical oriented learning.








Sir.

This has reference to the visit of the UGC's inspection Committee to the University on 22-23rd October, 2018 and subsequent compliance submitted by the University in respect of the observations/suggestions given by the UGC's inspection Committee. The report of the inspection Committee along with the compliance submitted by the University was placed before Committee of UGC members for consideration. The Committee recommended as under-

The Committee considered the report of the UGC's inspection Committee and compliance submitted by the University in respect of the report.

The Committee has observed as under:

- The university is functioning in the Garden City College, Indiranagar, Bangalore. The physical infrastructure, amenities and facilities required for teaching, academic administration, extension activities etc. are available only in the Garden City College.
- The facilities are adequate for the courses presently offered by the University.
- As per Notification issued by the Government of Karnataka dated 12.12.2016, the land earmarked to establish the University campus is at Yalachahalli, Hosakoe, Bengaluru District.
- 4. University is not yet established in the new campus.
- The UGC Expert Committee recommended that UGC may grant approval to Garden City University till 2021-22. Further approval may be accorded after functioning of Garden City University at Yalachahalli, Hosakoe, Bengaluru District.



Curricular Design

The programmes at Garden City University are formulated incorporating several essential elements to give the students in depth knowledge and professional competence with the following objectives:

- Knowledge enhancement
- Industry integration
- Research Progression

The Curriculum design at GCU is focussed on the students practical quotient and experiential learning. This helps in emphasising on the personal, academic and professional growth of each student. GCU_CD (GCU Curriculum Development) had incorporated a system development Model which has 5 phases: Planning, Designing, Implementing, Analysis of outcome, Scope for improvement.

The GCU_CD model takes to consideration the time frame of the course under each programme and the methodology followed in teaching learning process.

The 5 phase model identified the need of the hour and transformed this need into learning objectives in the planning phase and chose appropriate strategies for curriculum transaction and explored relevant learning experiences. Progressive testing on the analysis of outcome and necessary suggestions were given for the scope for improvement.

The orientation of GCU_CD curriculum is constructive in nature and is multi-centred ie., knowledge centred, society centred – with emphasis on JOL (Joy of Learning), PDSK(Professionally Doing and Scientifically Knowing), PEQ (Practical Exposure Quotient), ARM (Ambition Resource Mentoring) thereby extracting the hidden talents from students for a better nation. The GCU_CD helps in exploring relevant learning experiences. A detailed analysis of the previous academic year performances was made and the curriculum was accordingly amended wherever necessary.

Academic Flexibility

GCU follows the Choice Based Credit System pattern and the students have the flexibility of choosing their courses.

The students have the option of selecting languages in their course on Modern Indian Languages.

Selection of Generic Electives where in the student chooses to do a course offered by any school of study.

Selection of Discipline Specific Electives - the students are offered choice of courses in their V and VI semesters to choose from.

The students also have the flexibility to choose the area in which they want to do their dissertation or internship.



Curriculum Enhancement

Education has to constantly evolve and grow to meet the needs of our ever changing society. In recent years the pace of change has become very rapid and in certain areas, our education system has struggled to implement the changes needed to keep pace. Curriculum defines the education system in terms of a body of courses to be run as a guide. Undoubtedly, out of curriculum comes curriculum reforms. The process of curriculum change in higher education institutions, involves an interplay of global, national and institutional factors. Generally, it takes many forms and directions within which the meanings and methods of education delivery are altered.

At Garden City University (GCU), curriculum reform has been accepted as a process that changes the shape and nature of higher secondary degrees reflecting generally acknowledged academic standards of excellence; skills, knowledge, and understanding to help students prepare for the future; and the goals and mission of the University. No effort at reform can succeed without adequate support for the members of faculty who have primary responsibility for the curriculum, nor can it succeed unless it addresses the needs of a diverse student population.

GCU has introduced CARES (CONTENT ANALYSIS AND REVIEW OF EXISTING SYLLABUS).

The goals of higher education curricula should include mastery of basic skills, active participation in the learning process, indepth study, critical thinking, understanding of a discipline's characteristic methods, and a coherent and relevant course of study. The goals should also be consistent with GCU principles such as faculty control, equal access to quality education for all students, and multicultural understanding.

GCU is the culmination of 27 years of successful operation of Garden City College of Science & Management Studies affiliated to Bangalore University and Garden City College of Physiotherapy affiliated to Rajiv Gandhi University of Health Sciences. Moreover, all the professional courses offered here are approved by All India Council for Technical Education. Garden City College has undergone three cycles of reaccreditation by National Assessment & Accreditation Council (NAAC) with the highest grade "A". The institution has also received ISO 9001:2008 and ISO 14001:2004 certifications.

While conducting the curriculum provided by these renowned Universities, various difficulties were faced in terms of reviewing and revising the curriculum. Flexibility to acquaint with the global changes and implementing the need of the hour courses was missing in the curriculum. That is why, GCU started its operations of curriculum development with the presence of syllabus content from these renowned Universities retaining up to a maximum of 75% along with the mix of

contents generated under the directives of national and state planning commission on education.

Considering the above mentioned points, GCU has taken up the following reforms while designing the curriculum and applying CARES helps us in focussing on the following:

- 1. Introduction of curriculum plan: At GCU, we have introduced the concept of designing goals, objectives of development and learning outcomes for each of the courses which answer three basic questions that a student might be having before he/she begins studying the course Why am I studying this course? How am I going to learn the concepts? And, what am I going learn out of this course?
- 2. Introduction of learning outcome framework KLAAp: At GCU, we emphasize on the fact that learning doesn't happen only through classroom lectures but through application and analysis of those concepts. We strongly believe that experiential learning is the principal catalyst behind academic development of a student. With the same objective, we have designed a learning outcome framework called "KLAAp". Here, K stands for "to know and to understand", L stands for "to learn and to remember", A stands for "to analyze" and Ap stands for "to apply".
- **3. Introduction of teaching plan:** Teaching plan of a course comprises of all the methods and tools that a lecturer will use in making the lecture delivery in the class. This is a unique way of making a guideline or a reference point for lecture delivery that is adopted at Garden City University.
- **4. Periodic revision of the curriculum:** At GCU, we believe on realignment of the curriculum structure with respect to the need of the industry and current trends. We revisit the curriculum plan at the level of each programmes and take a top-down approach even up to the level of each sub unit. We also collect feedback from various stakeholders to arrive at a revised curriculum if required.
- **5. Restructuring the curriculum:** We consider restructuring the curriculum depending upon the need of the society, industry and feedback from the various stakeholders. This exercise is carried out once in each academic year at the level of each academic school which means every new semester has revised syllabi.
- **6. Reassess the course content:** Assessment of the course content in line with the course objective is done once in each academic year to check the relevance of the same in terms of learning outcome desired.
- **7. Introduction of new and innovative courses:** New and innovative courses are introduced keeping in mind the industry demand, e.g., business analytics course



in BBA is introduced to cater to the growing need of analytics professionals in the industry, worldwide chartered accountancy certifying body's syllabus is integrated into the BCom syllabus to make the BCom students prepared for these certifications in future if need arises.

- **8. Industry integration and alliances:** Integration and alliances with industry bodies and organizations like Atos, Oracle academy and IBM are done to create career oriented courses as advised by UGC.
- 9. Academic alliances and collaborations with the centre of excellence: Academic collaborations are done with various centres of excellence like Indian Institute of Management Bangalore, Indian Institute of Technology Mumbai and Indian Institute of Science Bangalore to add value to the various programmes offered at Garden City University.
- 10. Revision of reference material with concurrence to the centre of excellence: Course materials and content are constantly revised in concurrence with the various centres of excellence like Indian Institute of Management Bangalore, Indian Institute of Technology Mumbai and Indian Institute of Science Bangalore.
- **11. International alliances:** International acceptability and accessibility is created for the students of Garden City University by signing MoUs with foreign universities like Universidad Camilo Jose Cela (Madrid, Spain), University of Sorbonne (France), Universiti Putra Malaysia (Selangor, Malaysia) and Hadassah Academic College (Jerusalem, Israel).
- **12.** Career oriented modules leading to higher placement cap: Various career oriented modules are incorporated in the programmes of Garden City University to raise the employability of students like data analysis through excel, Foreign language courses, etc.
- 13. Local and National communicative process leading to removal of MTI: Introduction of local and national language courses for all the students is an initiative towards removal of the mother tongue influence in each of them.

- **14. Certification courses from IIM, KPMG & IBM:** Students at Garden City University are given options to undertake various certificate courses offered by Indian Institute of Management Bangalore, KPMG and IBM in order to achieve their career goals.
- **15. MOOCs:** Massive Open Online Courses are integrated in the pedagogy of Garden City University to create a sense of self responsibility in the students and also give them an edge over the students of other institutions.



GCU Feedback Assessment System (2018-2019) Automation In Feedback Collection System

INTRODUCTION

At Garden City University Feedback management system is a continuous process which enables students to submit their feedback for a particular class around the semester. The process of collection of feedback for particular session is collected through the online portal. The feedback questionnaire is a generic form which is provided to every student through their student portal. The frequency of submission of feedback from the students is based on their individual prerogative but the standard of frequency is fixed at minimum 3 and maximum 10 feedback submissions. The questionnaire includes sets of responses which the students either need to tick or choose from a drop-down option provided in the portal. The responses from the student's end is collated with the help of a calculation matrix which considers the mean value of the total responses accumulated and assigns a score for the individual session or the faculty member. The feedback responses from the student's end are kept anonymous and the resultant score can be viewed only by the administrator's login which can be viewed by the Registrar of the University. After the collation of the feedback report the feedback management system form is filled with the data and shared with the Registrar's Office. The feedback collection method is followed throughout the semester and the academic audit team strictly monitors the functioning of the feedback submission and further proceedings. The necessary measures to address any concern raised through the feedback report is opined and governed by the Office of the Registrar. The continuous monitoring of the measures undertaken to resolve any concern as raised during the feedback submission from the student's end is also under the observations of the Office of the Registrar.

Principles of Feedback Management System:

- Active engagement techniques employed by faculty members are assessed through feedback.
- Enhancement of teaching learning experience through feedback management system.
- Communication pertaining to the information about the feedback is delivered directly to the students.
- Schedule specific collection of feedback (timely submission).
- The quality of the feedback collection method is maintained properly.
- The rate of delivery of the feedback reports are consistent.

OBJECTIVES

- 1. To establish a systematic process to collect the suggestions from different stake holders about the modes of action to be implemented for further improvements of the academic processes.
- 2. To develop a common platform to share suggestions among the teachers and the students to facilitate the development of customized teaching tool. Depending on the student's interest and the ability of retention, the teacher can design his or her method of course delivery.
- 3. To establish a culture of fair academic processes in the campus. The feedback assessment model provides transparent analysis of the feedback report and further actions are considered.
- 4. To monitor the status of the teaching learning experience among students for a particular class.
- Depending on the feedback assessment report the governing authorities can implement certain alterations in the academic processes.

Examination and Evaluation

End Semester Examination (ESE)

- Assessment Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) + End Semester Examination (ESE) – 40% + 60%
- The duration of the ESE varies based on the number of credits of the course. For a 4-credit course the ESE is for 2 hours. For a 3-credit course the ESE is for 1 ½ hours and for a 2-credit course it is for one hour.
- The question papers are generated through an automated system
- Pre-preparation of question bank reviewed by internal as well as external experts
- Every question paper has a bar code on the top right-hand corner. The question papers carry a barcode indicating the course type.
- For courses that are common to all the programmes different types of question papers (A, B, C) are generated to avoid malpractice.
- Check points and security features in the system:

The system is designed in such a way that it permits the generation of question papers of only those courses that have an examination on that day. As such there cannot be a pre-printing of the question paper.

Every question paper carries a unique bar code that is linked to the subject code.

There is an OTP created during generating the question paper, the OTP is received by the Controller of Examinations through mail and the paper can be viewed only by providing the right OTP.

The question papers can be printed only in the access monitored printer attached to the given system.

The question papers are printed on papers that carry a security feature.

The question papers generated and printed are then distributed room wise in various packets and sealed before taking it out of the control room.

- The answer booklets are designed such that they do not carry the register number of the student, instead there is a unique bar code which each answer booklet carries and this unique bar code is linked to the student register number, the semester, the programme and the course.
- Registration for examination is online and the hall tickets are also generated online through the GCU student portal.
- The hall tickets are linked to the attendance as well as the CIA, thus the students who fail to secure the required attendance and CIA will not be able to print their hall tickets.
- The hall tickets carry a bar code which is scanned during their entry into the examination hall. This bar code is linked to the student register number and the photo.
 Students who are not eligible are denied access in to the examination hall.
- The seating positions of each student is marked by a seat number instead of the register number. A seat matrix paste at the entrance of the examination venue helps the student identify the seat number they are tagged to.
- The students are required to be in the examination hall 30 minutes prior to the commencement of the examination. Students are strictly prohibited entry if they are late.
- Once in the examination hall the first 30 minutes is used to distribute the answer booklets, take the signature of the student in the room supervisor diary. The question papers are distributed 10 minutes prior to the commencement of the examination, the students are given a 10 minutes reading time.
- Students are expected to remain in the examination hall till the completion of the examination and are not permitted to leave earlier.
- The entire process of examination is under surveillance, and a team of squad members constantly monitor the process.
- The university has established a University Malpractices Lapses Enquiry Committee (GCU UMLEC –University Malpractices & Lapses Enquiry Committee) that would check on all the malpractice cases.
- End Semester Examination for a few courses is online (MCQ) type as well as practical performance based.



ESE Evaluation Procedure GCU Board of Evaluation (BoE):

- The BoE is responsible to conduct the centralized evaluation process. The board conducts two types of evaluations: Written exam and Online evaluation.
- Evaluation of Online examination: The SEC papers such as Speaking Kannada, Use cases of predictive analytics examinations are conducted online and the evaluation is also done automatically.
- Evaluation of written examination process:

- The first steps starts with the appointment of examiners for each semester which shall be made and confirmed before 30 days of the commencement of the examination for both theory and practical. The list of examiners and reviewers are prepared and handed over to board of evaluation for the conduct of centralized valuation.
- In case of UG The list of internal evaluator and the reviewer will be handed over to BoE.
- In case of PG The list of internal evaluator and external evaluator will be handed over to BoE.
- In case of practical and Viva voce examination The list of internal evaluator and external evaluator will be handed over to BoF
- Online examination Computerized evaluation is integrated into the system.


- The board of evaluation will receive the answer scripts on session basis from the board of examination and the scripts are recoded with random barcode numbers. After recoding the answer scripts are ready for evaluation.
- The examiner/Evaluator and reviewer will jointly prepare the answer key and has to submit the same to the board of evaluation before they start the evaluation.
- The answer scripts are evaluated by the Examiner/Evaluator and then reviewed by the reviewer. The reviewer values the 20% of the answer scripts and will check the total of all the scripts.
- The marks will be entered in the portal by the evaluator, and the entered marks will be duly verified by the Custodian of the evaluation.
- On completion of entire evaluation, the results will be published in the GCU portal.

Norms of Revaluation

- Revaluation norms as created by the Office of Controller of Examinations, Garden City University is as per the standards of the University Academic Evaluation Standards and any decision considered by the Garden City University Evaluation & Assessment Committee will stand as final statement (duly signed by the Registrar, Garden City University).
- The student should remit the revaluation fee of Seven hundred and fifty rupees only for individual course/paper through online. This is to inform the student that a receipt no. will be generated once the online payment is accepted at our end.
- If the marks awarded by the revaluation committee has an enhancement of 20% from the original marks secured by the student, the revaluation fee will be refunded.
- In case, if there is no change in the marks secured after the revaluation it will be communicated to you as 'No Change in Marks Obtained'.

- The student should abide by the norms prescribed under the revaluation committee and should accept the revised marks as per the below mentioned categories:
 - a) there can be "NO CHANGE IN MARKS OBTAINED"
 - b) there can be **"ENHANCEMENT IN MARKS OBTAINED"**
 - c) there can be "DECREASE IN MARKS OBTAINED"
- If there is no change in marks post the revaluation process, the marks obtained by the student in the previous assessment will only be considered and there will be no further changes accepted. The student should select the courses in which you seek revaluation very carefully. There will be no second chance to apply for revaluation for any additional courses/papers. The result announced by the evaluation committee is final.
- The change in marks (if any) shall be conveyed to you through the students' portal only.
- The student should abide by the final marks statement.




Universite



Anti-Ragging Measures

- Government/University Grants Commission (UGC), guidelines notified vide no.F.1-16/2009 (CPP-II) dated 21-10-2009 on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009 (Under Section 26(1) (g) of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956) are strictly implemented at Garden City University, Bengaluru.
- * The Advertisement for Admissions clearly mentions: "Ragging is totally banned in Garden City University and anyone found guilty of ragging and/or abetting ragging will be appropriately punished"
- ❖ Garden City University conducted awareness programme on anti-ragging & consequences of ragging & hand-outs with full text of Anti-Ragging Regulations was given.
- ❖ Filing of a complaint by the affected student with the Police Authority (as per the Supreme Court's Directive) is implemented as well.
- Continuous watch and vigil over ragging is done by the University.
- ❖ The application form for admission/enrolment has a printed undertaking to be filled up and signed by the candidate to the effect that he/she is aware of the institution's approach towards ragging and the punishments to which he or she shall be liable if found guilty of ragging. A similar undertaking is obtained from the parent/quardian of the applicant.
- Students are encouraged to report any ragging act witnessed or experienced by them to the University administrators, faculty, Student Affairs and Grievances Committee or other any staff member with whom the student may feel comfortable.
- Anti-ragging movement is initiated by Garden City University right from the time of advertisement for admissions. The prospectus, the form for admission and/or any other literature issued to the aspirants for admission is clearly mentioned that ragging is banned in the university and anyone indulging in ragging is likely to receive deterrent punishment.

Disciplinary action / Punishments against Ragging in place at GCU

- Cancellation of admission.
- Suspension from attending classes.
- Withholding/withdrawing scholarship/fellowship and other benefits.
- Debarring from appearing in any test/examination or other evaluation process.
- Withholding / withdrawing scholarship / fellowship and other benefits.
- Debarring from representing the institution in any regional, national or international meet, tournament, youth festival,
- Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution for a specific period of time.
- Withholding results of the students who involved in ragging activities.
- Collective punishment: when the persons committing or abetting the crime of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment as a deterrent to ensure community pressure on the potential raggers.

Anti-Ragging Committees:

- ☐ The University constituted an "Anti-Ragging Committee" in the Chairmanship of the Registrar at the beginning of the academic year
- The University Authorities took necessary steps to sensitize students, parents, authorities about the gravity of ragging. This may be done with the help of audio-visuals, and through electronic and print mediums. Posters, banners and pamphlets highlighting the menace of ragging and its serious consequences were pasted at different places in the University.
- ☐ The Committee maintained alert vigil at all times and ensured that the Anti-Ragging Squads of the Institutions carried out their functions properly.
- ☐ The Anti-Ragging Squad made surprise raids on hostels, and other places that are vulnerable to such incidents



Awareness Campaigns- Anti-Ragging, Substance Abuse, Healthy Eating

- The University has been educating/ updating the students and their parents enrolled in various programmes in the University to be informed on Anti-Ragging activities before the beginning of the academic session 2018-19. This has helped us as is evident from the fact that no case of ragging was reported during the year 2018-19.
- In the Prospectus for Admission published by the University it is clearly stipulated that in case the applicant for admission is found indulged in ragging he/ she may be expelled from the University. The University website is also running an anti-ragging campaign since 2018-19.
- Undertaking from Students and Parents: Each of the student of the University and his/her parents or Guardian are hereby

- required to submit separate undertakings in the form of an affidavit at the time admission/ registration, in the format prescribed by UGC as attached to this office order, which is mandatory for admission/ registration.
- Formation of Committees and Squads: Complying with the directives of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India, the University has formed the Anti-Ragging Committee and squad for overseeing the implementation of the provisions of the verdict with immediate effect.
- The University level Anti-Ragging Committee and squad shall work to oversee the implementation of the recommendations in tune with the UGC Regulations.
- Garden City University displays the Anti Ragging posters inside the campus for creating awareness among the students.





Substance Abuse

The Counselling services at the Garden City University helps the students to come out with their problems through Student Support Services Cell. The Counselling Centre is monitored by Psychology Department and has been providing services like individual counselling and developmental group activities for GCU students. It is open six days a week and its hours are adapted to students needs. The Counsellors help the students in their day-to-day concerns and also enhance their overall functioning. Workshops on topics relevant to increasing the capacities of the students are regularly conducted by the Counsellors.

The Process of Counselling:

At Garden City University, counselling is a systematic process involving the following steps:

- Counselling provides a safe and trusting environment.
- It helps the person understand their concerns clearly and resolve them.
- The counsellors listen to students/clients issues/concerns in a non-judgmental manner.
- Counsellors help clients to generate solutions to their problems.
- Psychological Support service is provided for students who
 present with acute and transient conditions and common
 mental health problems such as examination anxiety,
 adjustment and mood disorders, or ongoing problems from
 interpersonal and personality difficulties.

Healthy Eating

At GCU, Healthy eating is of utmost importance. Predominately, all the seasonal ingredients are procured from GCU Organic farm. The efforts provide an opportunity for the students and other stakeholders of GCU to enjoy a healthy, tasty, and nutritious meal. A standard committee comprises of students, faculty members, chefs, and administrative staff members who meet on a periodical basis to review the quality of the food served, analyze the satisfaction report, plan a cyclic menu, hygiene and cleanliness parameters are discussed in detail. A balanced meal and menu which caters to the needs of students from across geographical locations are provided. To monitor the quality, a roster system is followed to check the food quality served in the university. A food tasting sheet which covers the quality parameters of the food, cleanliness, and upkeep of the kitchen and storage areas is provided to the faculty designated to monitor the quality. If there are any deviations observed, and corrective measures are taken.

Besides, periodic inspections are carried out in Food & Beverage vendors to check the quality of the food served to the students, their standard followed in the production process, cleanliness and upkeep of the unit.

Besides, an awareness drive on healthy eating habits is conducted to ensure that students reduce the intake of junk foods and opts for healthy food choice.

Anti Sexual Harassment Cell

The aim of the cell is to develop the guidelines and norms for policies against the sexual harassment in all its forms and its implementation. This will be achieved by organizing gender sensitization awareness programs and dealing with the cases of discrimination and sexual harassment as and when arise. This objective is achieved by establishing an Anti Sexual Harassment Cell.

Parents Teachers Meeting

We at GCU believe that Parents, Teachers and Alumni are the three pillars that mold a student as they build their career path. As parents ensure to give the best education to their child we assure to deliver the best. The progress of every student is enabled through structured mentoring and handholding during critical junctures of the academic journey. Best Practices

ACADEMICS:

- 1. Garden City University curates a detailed academic calendar at the beginning of every academic year and all activities are carried out while strictly adhering to the same.
- 2. Fresherism, a week-long fresher's orientation programmes for newly enrolled students are conducted at the beginning of every academic year. The students are inducted with the opportunities that the University offers and get familiarized with the facilities in the University.
- 3. At the beginning of every new academic year, the students are provided with student's handbook consisting of all related information pertaining to academic practices and generic information pertaining to administrative practices. All the information is shared with the students through portal and e-mail.
- 4. The newly enrolled students are familiarized with the two libraries to inculcate amongst the students the habit of reading and to expose them to the vast reading repository of the University. The University Library, which has a vast repository of books, journals, periodicals and online resources, is supported by the librarian and other staffs which works till 10 pm for every day.
- 5. A Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIA) process has been adopted for all programmes of study in the University. The CIA marks is assessed for 40 marks and 20 marks (for 100 marks and 50 marks subject respectively). The major components of CIA assessment include – class participation, timely submission of assignments, interim assessment, teacher's prerogative (participation in extracurricular and co-curricular activities). The Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) is the basic structure followed for developing the curriculum. The "KLAAp" model which was inspired by the principles of Bloom's Taxonomy is mathematically designed to evaluate the learning outcome weightage percentage for an individual course.
- 6. Online system operated examination process is in practice at the University. An individual faculty in charge for a particular paper will prepare a question bank and will submit into the portal. The portal is created with an algorithm that will randomly select questions from the question bank and will give sets of the question paper which can only be accessed by the Controller of Examination (COE) only half an hour before the start of the examination. The seat matrix allocation is also generated through the online portal which depends on the algorithm

- designed based on the date of examination, classroom number and the allotted number of the students. The question bank is reviewed by the students and peer members in the department. The admit card for the examination can be downloaded from the portal by the students who are eligible to appear for the examination. An online examination for elective subject is also conducted for the students as a part of Auto-evaluation based examination.
- 7. The University promotes application of the concept learnt through minor projects. To emphasize on the research and innovation, the University has constituted a research forum, GCU PERFECT – Projects Establishing Research Fraternity and Enhancing Core Technology. The aim of the minor projects is to instill research oriented study among the students and to create a pool of research projects which will have social impact and further scope of development. GCU PERFECT collated 72 projects of core and interdisciplinary courses. Each of these research proposals were granted research funds from the Chancellor's Office.
- 8. The students are also assessed based on their level of participation in various co-curricular activities like guiz, debates, drama, music, theatre, elocution etc. The assessment method consists of a list of innovative 40 assessment techniques which incorporates factors like participation in intra departmental and inter-collegiate events and also the capability of students organizing the
- 9. The students are encouraged to do internships and research projects at reputed institutions outside. The credits are added into the marks card as 6 credits and a report submission post the internship is also to be submitted for evaluation purpose. The first induction workshop for the PG Internship Programme in collaboration with Putra Business School, Malaysia was conducted in the month of September.
- 10. Every alternative Saturdays in a month, a research colloquium forum conducts a panel discussion and brainstorming session on Research Methodology and recent innovations in core and interdisciplinary research. These sessions are also attended by the PhD scholars, teaching staffs and students with research orientation. This discussion forum proposes for a white paper submission to the research and innovation council of the University about the latest findings on the discussion outcomes.
- 11. The students are encouraged to submit their abstracts and full paper for national and international conferences

- both internal departments and external University. After the inception of the University, it has organized two international conferences which encompassed themes like knowledge transfer, data security, corporate social responsibility etc.
- 12. The University also constitute an Innovation club which deals with exchange of innovative ideas between the students and the faculty members to generate product based on a particular idea. The idea is generally curated by the panel of experts which includes research scholars, patent attorney and angel investors. To promote the "idea to product" concept, GCU has initiated "Chancellor's Young Innovators Award" to enhance the research & innovation practices among the students. The first phase of the event was organized on 14th September, 2018 and a total of 31 project proposals were submitted. All the projects submitted are under the inspection of the patent attorney to understand the chances of patent registration for the individual idea.
- 12. The University has an ILEAP (INNOVATIVE LEARNING AND ENGAGING ACADEMIC PRACTICES) forum which holds regular interactions and meetings to discuss on best teaching practices and design innovative pedagogical tools. The best teaching methodology is presented in front of the teaching fraternity of the University and other faculty members.
- 13. The evaluation procedure in the University follows a robust online cloud assisted process which involves online creation of the assignment, online submission of the assignment, online criteria based assessment, allocation of marks for class participation, timely submission of assignment, participation for extra-curricular activities etc. The assessment marks are also displayed online through the portal. The students can also view any suggestions that the faculty member have forwarded through their portal into the student's portal.
- 14. The online portal for the students also constitute of the repository resources, which the students can refer for their course preparation. The faculty member also uploads reading material content pertaining to the recent researches in the field of study.
- 15. The students can also submit feedback for a particular session through the online portal. The feedback questions are marked with particular score and assembly of all the scores results into a cumulative feedback score for an individual faculty. After the cumulative score being assessed in the feedback management report, any faculty

- in-charge with least cumulative score will be meeting the Registrar and suggestions from the Office of the Registrar is discussed with the concerned faculty member.
- 16. The students of the University can submit their grievance pertaining to any academic or any other activities in the campus through the portal. The anonymity of the student submitting the grievance through the portal is kept hidden for the administrator. The grievance registered through the portal can be tracked through the text messages and the redressal of the registered grievance will be done within 24 hours from the time of registration.
- 17. The guestions in the guestion bank format are distributed based on the learning outcome model "KLAAp" as 15 % is defined for questions pertaining to "Know & Remember", 20 % is defined for "To Learn & Understand", 30 % is defined for questions pertaining to "Analyze" and 35% is defined for "To Apply". The questions are also distributed in the question bank based on the concepts and units. The algorithm designed for random selection of questions is based on the KLAAp, concepts of the units, number of units/sub-units.
- 18. The students of the University can also enroll for the GCU Finishing School which hones the soft skills and the technical skills of our students and prepares them for the industry. 

Personal Academic Advisor (PAA)

Report 2018-19

PAA strives to increase student success at GCU by connecting students with a faculty member. Faculty members use Motivational Interviewing principles, programme expectations, campus resources, and referral process to aid and advice their students. The Motivational Interviewing encourages the student to change their academic performance, behaviour and engage in positive opportunities for growth and development.

Goals of PAA

- Monitor student's academic performance and suggest measures for successful progression.
- Evaluate academic interest and recommend elective or addon courses.

- Create an awareness of the rules and regulations of the University to increase accountability for personal behaviour on the student's part.
- To understand student intrinsic and extrinsic factors affecting academic progress and reduce dropouts and increase student success.

In order to meet those goals, a student (mentee) is paired with a faculty member (PAA Personal Academic Advisor), whom they meet with an average of four times over a semester. During the scheduled one-on-one meetings, the mentee and mentor develop a relationship which focuses on student engagement, healthy choices, academic success, examination of social situations from different perspectives, and student success at GCU.

The department's infrastructure consists of well-dedicated labs such as Exercise Therapy, Electro




