STUDENT'S PROFICIENCY IN USING LEARNING MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

The emergence of COVID-19 pandemic in March 2020, made all educational institutions across the globe shut down their operations for an indefinite period. Garden City University has always believed in and strived to ensure the process of education should never stop. With this view in mind, online classes were started within 7 days of closing the campus along with readily available content for the students to refer to (since library access was also not there for the students). As a university, we used the following tool for Learning Management System (LMS) creation:

- 1. Microsoft Teams
- 2. Microsoft Sway
- 3. Microsoft Outlook

We developed content for each sub-unit of a unit of each course in a particular semester of a programme. There was an overwhelming number of Microsoft Sway content created by the faculty members of Garden City University. Microsoft Sway is a newsletter kind of platform, wherein, content can be arranged aesthetically by embedding videos, audios, podcasts, excel workbooks, presentations, etc. We used Microsoft Teams to conduct interactive sessions, discussion forums, Q and A session with the students to discuss the contents developed. One MS Team Channel is created for each semester of a programme in Microsoft Teams so that communication specific to sessions, course delivery, notebooks, particular to that programme can be delivered to those set of students. Each and every communication posted in Microsoft Teams reaches every student as an email alert in their Microsoft Outlook email account. An understanding of the number of interactions that happened with the students is given below:



The main objective of the PTM was to reach out to the parents of GCU students and assure them about the performance of their wards and the measures taken to combat the COVID-19 crisis.

Report: The brochure was shared, and parents registered using the QR code/link. The mode of and time of contact were selected by parents according to their convenience. The details were sorted and sent to the respective HoDs, who in turn assigned the faculty members and shared the details regarding the time and mode of contact selected by the parent/guardian. Parents were contacted at the time and the performance of their ward was discussed.

The overall response was very good, and parents took part actively by registering and attending the meeting. Parents appreciated the initiative and were very happy that the university took the step to contact them and assure them during the period of uncertainty.

- 69% of the respondents confirmed that they were highly satisfied with the interaction with the PAA.



It can involve using technology like – Augmented reality, Deep Learning, or something as common and necessary as the Internet to let students explore and understand things. The main objective thus for adopting innovative teaching is to motivate students to think out of the box and think creatively. After exploring all possible information, the students must be encouraged to formulate their thoughts to list potential solutions.
Context and Challenges	Keeping up to date with ever-changing technologies and striving to find innovative ways to integrate them into a classroom setting are constant challenges to all educators. Clearly, technology is associated with changes in practice, but the nature of this association is complex and contested. Innovation in education has always been related to technological developments, but it can also be achieved by introducing changes to teaching practices, curricula, and learning activities, all of which can be regarded as activities included in the knowledge management and transfer paradigm.
The practices	Flip the Classroom- students review lecture material at home and work on projects and assignments in the classroom. Students in the flipped classroom complete coursework typically sent home as homework in class. The flipped classroom provides a great space for peer-to-peer collaboration. Students can engage one another to complete group projects, debates, and practice. Personalized Learning- Personalized learning provides a catered learning experience and methods that are optimized for individual students. Though these individualized learning journeys are different for each student, the end goal is subject mastery or meeting standards for their grade level. So, we can think of these as different paths leading to the same place. Project-Based Learning (PBL)- Project-based learning is an active method of learning where students gain mastery through the application of their knowledge rather than rote memorization. Like the flipped classroom, the teacher's role becomes that of a guide and the students take ownership of their learning. Inquiry-Based Learning- develops thinking and problem-solving skills. Instead of driving the class through a lecture-style format, the teacher poses questions, scenarios, and problems. Students then research these topics individually or in groups to formulate their answers. Peer Teaching-Provide them with the opportunity to independently research the topic and create a presentation on it. Set aside class time for students to present to the class to teach their peers about their topic. With peer teaching, students learn skills such as independent study, presentation skills, and confidence. Blended Learning-Blended learning combines physical and online learning experiences that give students more control over the time, place, path, and pace of instruction. The flexibility of blended learning enables students to have more control

	over their learning methods – perhaps they'll watch online lectures at home and engage in peer groups for collaborative activities or maybe they'll prefer to join lecture-based virtual classes and do their homework independently.

The practices	The hotel industry is a very large industry that grows day by day with some innovations. The hotel industry is interrelated with customers and services. But the base of the hotel industry is its hard-working employees who include some experienced employees and some freshers. During hotel management courses we provide one day or two-day industrial visits to their students which helps students to observe the real work scenario of the hotel industry. Industrial visit helps students to identify how hotel operations work. Many students have their own opinion regarding the impact and importance of the industrial visit to the hotel.

Areas of improvement	Improving on the Industrial relationship to increase the number of visits

Department: Tourism

Title of the Practice	Analysing tourism components at a destination through itinerary preparation
Objectives of the Practice	As a budding professional in the field of travel and tourism, one of the basic activities that we encourage students to try is to identify the components of tourism. Being a service industry, tourism components are of utmost importance for the phenomenon of tourism to be completed successfully. The students are allotted with a destination, and they are made to prepare an itinerary for the same. They are encouraged to choose a circuit. During this time the student must review the various components and elements involved in tourism and for successfully creating the tour package which brings in better understanding about the various players in the markets, products available, etc.
Context and Challenges	The exercise helps students in gaining knowledge about the various types of players in the market, their business plans and strategies, pricing of product which is of utmost importance. Through this exercise, students get a fair idea about pricing of various suppliers. Challenge comes when there is not enough information available especially in the public domain, during such times, the student is made to talk to the local suppliers and derive information from them. Talking to the local suppliers also helps them understand the problems faced by the suppliers and understand the demand pattern at a destination.
The practices	As a part of the activities conducted to engage students, the department has assigned this task to all the students. Each student was assigned with a particular destination on which they are supposed to prepare the itinerary upon. But besides preparing the itinerary, the student is supposed to review the current status of the destination as per the TALC model and identify all the various components of tourism. Once they identify the availability of those components, they search of the actual suppliers who contribute towards the availability of those components. All aspects of transportation system, road networks, railways (wherever applicable), air network (wherever applicable), types of accommodation types which include primary accommodation facilities as well as secondary accommodation facilities, amenities, activities for tourists, and of course the condition of the attractions, options to visit various attractions were analysed and the itinerary was prepared. The itinerary was then shared with the mentor who would review the work.

Title of the Practice	Analysing tourism components at a destination through itinerary preparation
Evidence of Success	Through this exercise, students have been able to better understand the importance of the components, which they were further able to place in the correct order. Each student stated their analysis by reviewing the destination using the Tourism Area Life Cycle model developed by Prof. Butler. The students, post review of this model was able to determine the state in which the destination is presently in. After this the students review the components. They start with accessibility which is the second component of tourism. This is followed by accommodation. In accommodation the various options that tourists have at the destination is reviewed. This is followed by the various amenities which are available at the destination. Part of the amenities are also included in the infrastructure of the destination, and this is followed by activities. The exercise has helped the students to understand the basic elements which are required for a place to succeed as a destination. It has also helped them in understanding the components of itinerary preparation.
Areas of improvement	One of the biggest challenges faced during this exercise is that students were not able to travel to any of the destinations while analysing it. The pandemic has stopped us from visiting destinations, especially those which cater to mass tourism. If the students were able to visit the destination, they could have seen and learnt the components better rather than learning from secondary data available in the public domain. In the post pandemic times, if the students can go on the study tour and are asked to analyse the destination, they would be able to attain much better understanding about the place.







The department of Physiotherapy, School of Health Sciences, Garden City University organized a health camp to raise awareness on regular health check-ups among the students and faculty members, and as a part of physiotherapy awareness, the staff and students conducted an outreach programme on "Maintaining a healthy lifestyle at the GCU adopted village of Thoranahalli. NEP IMPLEMENTATION AT GARDEN CITY UNIVERSITY

Garden City University launched NEP implementation on September 9, 2021, in the presence of Karnataka Minister for Higher Education Dr. C N Ashwatha Narayan.

The curriculum was restructured for 4 years (3 +1) and subjects were redesignated as a major, minor, or as an open elective. The various skill development and Ability enhancement courses were applied as per the model program structures provided by Karnataka State Higher Education Council.

The various departments followed different models recommended by the Karnataka Higher Education Council in order to cater to the requirement of NEP 2020. GCU was already following CBCS – Choice Based Credit System, and therefore, implementation of NEP 2020 into the curriculum was not challenging, but welcoming. This NEP implementation helped our students to choose subjects that they are interested in, and inculcate more ability enhancement, skill enhancement and value based education.

Case presentation is done by students, which includes analyzing the condition of patient, his/her assessment, treatments and recent evidences. The undergraduate students are made to present their cases looking into the specific details like clinical features, pathology, differential diagnosis etc., and, the PG students presents detailed assessment and treatment with recent evidences. The 7th semester students and PG students combined to do case presentations of patients. These presentations are moderated by the faculty members to provide timely reviews and corrections.

Responsibilities of faculty members attending to patients in the GCU Physiocare:

Two faculty members are posted in Physiocare for patient care in the morning and afternoon on monthly rotation basis. Faculty members do the assessment, treatment plan, documentation of patient details who visit GCU Physiocare directly or referred by other hospitals. PG students are posted along with faculty members in the Physiocare to get hands on training along with the trained faculty members. GCU Physiocare is open even on holidays to cater to the patients. Garden City University believes in better practical exposure quotient for the students and so, the UG students are posted for observation and learning as part of their curriculum. The well-trained faculty members conduct case presentations for both PG and UG students.
